COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course provides an introduction to criminal justice in the United States. The primary goal of this course is to introduce you to various elements in criminal justice to include the police, courts, corrections, and examine a number of special issues relevant to criminal justice today.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to understand and discuss criminal justice in America. The aim is to develop a greater understanding of the justice system and to acquire knowledge of terms and concepts related to this system. Additionally, this course should foster an appreciation of the role of professionals involved including law enforcement (e.g., police officers, social workers, and probation officers), judges, prosecutors, and defense counsel in ensuring that constitutional protections of defendants are respected.

INSTRUCTION FORMAT: This course of instruction will be administered online using the discussion and module section in Canvas. Class participation, analysis, and informal debate are anticipated and encouraged. Each week students are expected to engage with the instructor and other classmates about the topics discussed. Discussions will be graded accordingly. See discussion rubrics on grading policy.

REQUIRED READING ASSIGNMENTS: Students are responsible for reading all assignments and materials, even those assignments and materials not covered in class lectures and discussions. Good notes are a must since students will also be responsible for lecture materials presented from sources outside the required reading assignments and materials.

CASE STUDIES: Each student will be required to prepare two case studies during the course regarding topics discussed. Each case study will require:

1. A **minimum of 3-pages**.
2. Written assignments must use **citations of original works within the body of the paper**.
3. Please watch for spelling and grammatical errors.
4. Research papers must contain a Title Page, at least 3 pages of text, be no more than double spaced, 12 fonts maximum, and one-inch margins max. See Case Study rubrics on grading policy

*****For further explanation of the case studies, you are to pick a topic of your own choosing. Please choose a case in criminal justice that interests you! Perhaps is it a case involving the death penalty, criminal justice reform, or one involving forensic science. Pick something that you would like to write about.**

1. **Your paper should include an introduction – Tell me about the case.**
2. **Your paper should have a body – Tell me about the decisions of the case and why it’s important.**
3. **Your paper should have a conclusion – Tell me your thoughts about the case, and whether or not you agree with them.**

Remember: Please cite all of your sources throughout your paper.

QUIZZES: Students will be expected to complete several quizzes during the course. Each exam will contain ten (10) multiple choice questions based on what was discussed in the previous weeks. These exams will be made available on Sunday at the beginning of the week and students **must** complete them by Saturday at the end of the week. The Final Exam will consist of forty (40) multiple choice questions selected from each of the previous weeks.
