Course Description

Our daily lives are affected, consciously and unconsciously, by social forces and influences of which we are largely unaware. This introductory course to sociology, the scientific study of society, explores and uncovers the hidden factors behind the behaviors and attitudes of individuals, groups, and societies.

Course Objectives

By the end of this class you will be able to:

- Define key sociological terms & concepts.
- Critically examine the social institutions that make up society.
- Understand the causes and consequences of social division & inequality.
- Recognize and analyze sociological issues that you are exposed to in your everyday life.

Course Design

This course is run in an asynchronous format, which means that you will not have to log in at a certain class time to access or complete course material. The course is divided into weekly modules (see schedule below for specific dates & readings). Each module consists of:

- Overview lecture(s), which cover key concepts from each of the assigned textbook chapters.
- PowerPoint Slides, which correspond to what is covered in the lecture.

- An activity, which requires you to apply or elaborate on concepts/findings from the lecture(s).
- A quiz, which requires you to identify/explain concepts from the reading or lecture.

These materials will all be made available at the start of each module. Some weeks, we will also have an additional assignment due (like the documentary analysis). These are listed on the syllabus and will be made available on Canvas ahead of time.

Activities: You will be asked to complete an individual activity each week. These activities typically consist of discussion questions related to the reading, the application of key course concepts to research and policy scenarios, or responding to a video/prompt. Activities will be evaluated based on completion & appropriate application of course concepts on a 3-point scale.

- 3 pts= Completed all parts of activity & appropriately applied course material.
- 2 pts= Did not complete all parts of the activity **or** did not make sufficient connections to course material.
- 1 pt= Did not complete all parts of the activity **and** did not make sufficient connections to course material.

Quizzes: You will also be assigned a short quiz to complete a weekly quiz. Each quiz will be a mix of multiple choice, true/false, and short answer depending on the content covered. These quizzes are untimed and will be available to complete on Canvas.

Documentary Analysis: For this assignment, you will be required to watch *For the Love of Rutland*, which is a documentary that focuses on the demographics and politics of a changing community. It is available to watch for free at this website: <https://www.pbs.org/video/for-the-love-of-rutland-nmr9n/> After watching the documentary, you must write a summary and analysis of the film, which should include a brief overview of the main themes/claims presented in the documentary and an analysis of how the film connects to (or contradicts) course material. This assignment should be about 3 pages double spaced. More specific guidelines will be posted in the assignments folder on Canvas.

Research Review & Presentation: This assignment requires you to take a closer, research-informed look at a topic from our textbook that you find particularly interesting. More specifically, you'll be asked to craft a research question, identify a research article that seeks to answer this question, and then analyze and present the findings from this article.

The research review portion of this assignment should be about 3 pages double spaced and should include a summary/description of the article that you selected and as an analysis of the findings, making specific connections to course material. The presentation portion should be about 5-7 minutes. Since this is an asynchronous online course, you will be asked to record your presentation and upload it to Canvas. Additional guidelines will be posted on Canvas closer to the due date.
